

Abdul-Latif Al Smoudi: A MAN OF ALL SEASONS

ABDUL-LATIF AL SMOUDI PASSED AWAY IN JUNE LAST YEAR. BORN IN SYRIA, HE RESIDED IN THE UAE FOR MANY YEARS. HE BROUGHT IN HIS PAINTINGS THE HISTORY OF HIS COUNTRY FUSED WITH MODERN ART.





n art gallery, in an old Arab house like structure, The Majlis Gallery is very enticing for all art lovers. The paintings in each room not only invite you to every room of the gallery but also give an idea of what the piece would look like if you were to hang that piece of art in your own home.

The season begins at this gallery with a retrospective exhibition 'Man of all seasons,' - 40 oil paintings by Syrian artist Abdul-Latif. This is the eighth time Majlis is showing his work, and this time, his last work. Abdul-latif Al Smoudi passed away in June last year. Born in Syria, he resided in the UAE for many years. He brought in his paintings the history of his country fused with modern art.

"I have seen him work and, more than anything else, he was a brilliant draftsman. His sincerity towards each piece was outstanding. This is a fairly small collection of 40 paintings; it was all that was left when he died. His family wanted to showcase his art to the world and that's why we've put it all


together," said Alison Collins, co-owner of the Majlis Gallery.

Abdul Latif's paintings have a modern yet a traditional insight to them. Two figures kissing each other or the use of calligraphy with geometric designs, use of symbols and iconography does make it a little abstract, yet it captures the art and history of the Arab world. Some paintings, so vibrant with colours and some so soothing with pastel shades, the canvasses invoke a sense of peace. Out of the 40 paintings all are for sale but five. The exhibition runs until October 29th.

The Majlis Gallery is a home for all contemporary artists like Abdul Latif,. And after 'A Man of All Seasons', it will house the work of Jamal Abdul Rahim, in an exhibition titled 'Graphic Statements', from 30 October to 12 November. The exhibition will include prints, paintings and expressionistic and figurative sculptures in bronze and stone.

Apart from these exhibitions, there's also an aesthetic display of jewellery, ceramics, quilts, furniture, cutlery and glassware, and the gallery also offers a comprehensive and cost effective framing service.

To label Evanescence's music by calling it just Rock pays no justice to their sound. Their music is a mixture of all genres of Rock - alternative,
